Spirit of God, an anthem for Pentecost, may also be used in observance of Lent, Ash Wednesday, Reformation Sunday, and baptism or communion services, as well as for general worship. Suggested corresponding lectionary readings include Luke 13: 22-30, John 14: 15-31, and Galatians 5: 22-26. One basic homilitical theme is the shaping and guiding of a life of discipleship through the Holy Spirit.

This gentle, sensitive arrangement of a much-loved Pentecost hymn employs fluid 4-measure phrases and a subtle sharing of the melody by the men's and women's voices. The descand in the final verse may be performed by a few high voices or by the solo flute (one octave higher). As an especially effective touch for your worship service, repeat the closing "amen" as a prayer response or benediction.
