## A Lincoln Tribute

The Lincoln Memorial is a majestic tribute to the 16th President, featuring a commanding seated sculpture of Lincoln. In 1963, the memorial was the setting for Martin Luther King Jr.'s famous "I Have a Dream" speech. According to legend, sculptor Daniel Chester French intentionally had Lincoln's hands form his initials in sign language—an "A" in his left hand and an "L" in his right (quite possible since the sculptor had a deaf son and knew sign language).

## Along the Potomac

## Washington's Fife and Drum Corps

By law, the Washington Monument is the tallest structure in the District of Columbia. Its reflection can be seen in the long rectangular Reflecting Pool that reaches west towards the Lincoln Memorial. On occasion, the U.S. Army's Old Guard Fife and Drum Corps gives performances at the monument, dressed in the traditional uniforms of Washington's Continental Army. This piece was inspired by the sound of the fife and drum corps; in measures 1–8, listen for the high-pitched sound of the fifes.
