




Written by the great American songwriter Cole Porter, "I Get a Kick Out of You" was featured in the Broadway musical *Anything Goes* (1934). Originally sung by Ethel Merman in the Broadway production, it was subsequently recorded by numerous legendary singers including Frank Sinatra, Ella Fitzgerald and Rosemary Clooney. Porter was famous for his clever lyrics, interesting rhymes and sophisticated compositions.


I GET A KICK OUT OF YOU

American composer and jazz pianist "Fats" Waller originally recorded this song in 1929, and later performed the piece in the 1943 film *Stormy Weather*. In 1978, a Broadway musical entitled *Ain't Misbehavin'* featured the music of "Fats" Waller. The show paid tribute to the African-American musicians of the Harlem Renaissance during the '20s and '30s, and won the Tony Award for Best Musical.

In 1924, American composer George Gershwin wrote this masterpiece for solo piano and orchestra. He was commissioned to write the piece by jazz conductor Paul Whiteman, to whom the work is dedicated. Gershwin completed the composition in only three weeks and originally named it *American Rhapsody*. It was his brother, Ira Gershwin, who suggested the title *Rhapsody in Blue*.

THEY CAN'T TAKE THAT AWAY FROM ME

Written by George and Ira Gershwin, "They Can't Take That Away from Me" was featured in the 1937 movie *Shall We Dance*. In the film, the song is performed by Fred Astaire, as he sings to Ginger Rogers on the deck of a ferry to Manhattan. Unfortunately, George Gershwin died only two months after the film's release. He was nominated posthumously for the 1937 Academy Award for Best Original Song.
