(Mexico)

Lacking newspapers, the Mexican natives outside the cities invented the 'corrido'—corresponding to the European 'ballad'—to convey to others the news of heroic deeds, accidents, love affairs, and so on. *Adolorido* is such a news-song, coming from the Bajío, or low, hot country around the state of Guanajuato. It tells of sadness over being betrayed by an ungrateful woman.

5 A FROG WENT A-COURTIN'

(U.S.A.)

There are many versions of this lilting tune, each one varying with the particular singer. The composer first heard it in a little village close to the mountainous section of Kentucky, and was told that it came from Virginia. Other regions also claim it as indigenous to them. The basic song is said to have been in continuous use for more than four hundred years.

Strict adherence to the 'lazy' tempo of this piece is necessary to preserve its droll character.
