Performance Notes

The big "hot spots" in music are the *transition spots*. These are identified by *key or time signature changes*, *tempo changes*, or *bell changes without key change*. Though not necessarily a transition, page turns must be practiced as well.

Rehearse all transitional sections four to five measures before they occur until a few measures into the new section. Don't stop! Directors should give a specific expectation for the next run, i.e. "Let's work on dynamics this time," rather than a general "Let's try that again." Ringers will respond well to focusing on one specific task for repetitions.
