THE MYTH OF YOUNG EAGLE

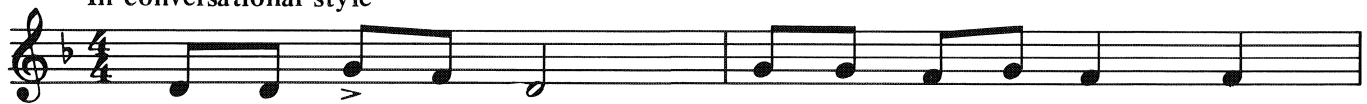
Paiute

The words of many Indian songs imply more than they say, often assuming generally accepted cultural beliefs without expressing them. In this song, it is assumed that Young Eagle really wishes to go East so that he can hunt jackrabbits, a task permitted only to men of the tribe. Having accomplished this, according to tradition, Young Eagle will then be able to find a wife.
