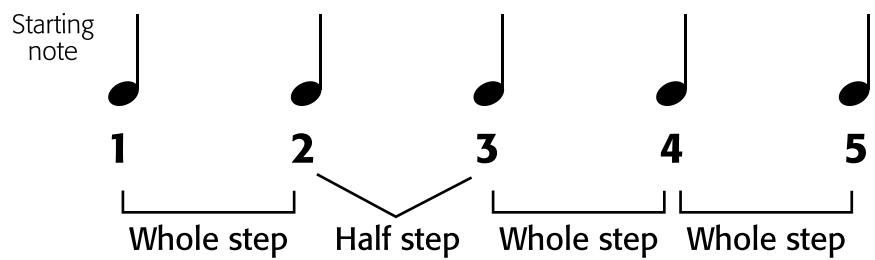


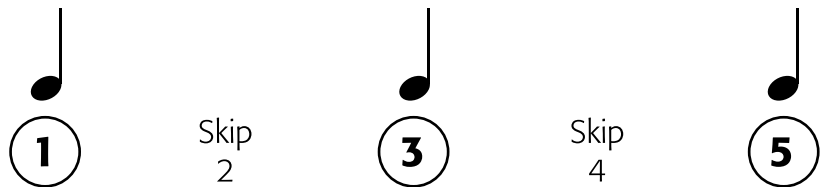
BUILDING MINOR FIVE-FINGER PATTERNS

A minor five-finger pattern is a series of five notes having this pattern:



BUILDING MINOR CHORDS

A minor chord consists of three notes: 1, 3 and 5 of the minor five-finger pattern.



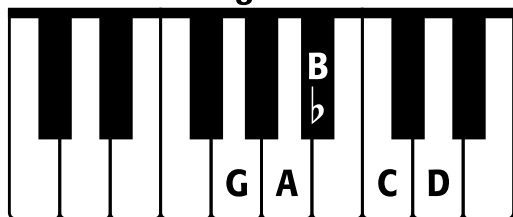

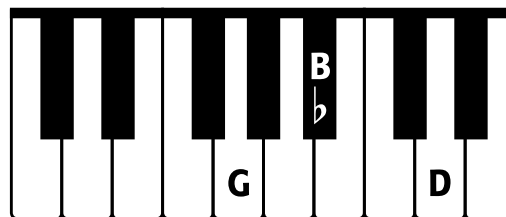
*E^b and D[#] are played alike on the keyboard.

Practice Suggestions for Five-Finger Patterns and Chords (pages 3–14)

1. Practice *legato*, hands separately, then hands together.
2. Practice *staccato*, hands separately, then hands together.
3. Practice RH *forte* and LH *piano*, then RH *piano* and LH *forte*.
4. Practice RH *legato* and LH *staccato*, then RH *staccato* and LH *legato*.
5. Practice using the following rhythm:

Practice Suggestions for Cadences (pages 3–14)

Example 1: Practice hands separately, then hands together.

Example 2: Play the LH root followed by the RH chord, then play as written.

After learning all five-finger patterns, arpeggios and cadences, practice in the following order(s):

Chromatically (by half steps): C C# D Eb E F F# G G# A Bb B C

Around the Circle of Fifths: A E B F# C# G# Eb Bb F C G D A
