
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When you see this CD icon, specific tracks are being recommended for the corresponding lesson.



THE FORWARD SCRATCH

The forward scratch is similar to the baby scratch except you want to hear only the push, the forward part of the scratch. Now you will need to get your mixer hand involved to cut out the pull-back of the platter. You can also use the forward scratch to simply play a sound in real time. As time goes on, you can combine the forwards to include both scratches and real-time sounds.

- 1. Play a beat or a tune on one of your players and move the cross-fader all the way over so you hear the music loud and clear.
- 2. On the other player, put on a CD with a good scratching sound and use your headphones to cue up a desired sound.
- 3. Put the scratch CD player in the scratch mode, put your hand on the platter to keep the CD from spinning, and push play.
- 4. Slide the cross-fader to the middle position and at the same time push the platter forward into the cued-up sound.
- 5. Hold the platter when you reach the end of the forward sound.
- 6. Slide the cross-fader back to the beat side and pull the platter back to the beginning of the sound. You shouldn't hear any of the pull-back sound.
- 7. Slide the cross-fader back to the middle and continue with your forward scratches.

To play the forward sound in real time, simply let go of the platter instead of pushing it forward, and then put your hand back down to stop it when the sound is over.

THE STAB

The stab scratch is essentially the same push movement as the forward scratch except you move the CD platter and cross-fader with much quicker, stab-like movement.
