## **Tintagel**

In the swirling winds around Tintagel, I hear the echo of King Arthur and his bold knights.

Tintagel, situated on the north coast of the county of Cornwall, is renowned for being the alleged site of King Arthur's castle. In fact, archaeologists have found evidence of a 5th-century dwelling here. The spectacular ruins of a second castle, built between 1230–1236 by the Duke of Cornwall, now cling precariously to the cliff's edge.



## St. Michael's Mount

Originally a 12th-century Benedictine monastery, St. Michael's Mount is connected to the mainland via a low causeway, but is inaccessible at high tide. This unique island has been the scene of military sieges, a place of pilgrimage, and supposed home of the mythical giant, Cormoran.
